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The Syrian Revolution

A Struggle for Freedom

On December 8th of 2024, Syrians all over the world woke up under a new title. They were no longer Syrian refugees, just Syrians.

The opposition fighters of Syria have declared. after vears 53 persecution, their homeland 'liberated'. A historic time has befallen the future of this country. The fall of Assad's regime calls for celebration from every corner of the world. Although it is largely uncertain what's to come, there is immense joy in the hearts of the entire Ummah as our brothers and sisters rejoice in their newfound freedom.





The Syrian Revolution, which began in March of 2011, was a peaceful uprising demanding political freedoms, economic reform, and an end to decades of authoritarian rule.

The revolution was fueled by widespread dissatisfaction with the Assad regime, which had oppressed Syria for over 50 years. Despite initial promises of reform by Bashar al-Assad, the regime remained deeply repressive. Syria faced rising unemployment, corruption, and the devastation of its infrastructure. Syrians took to the streets, demanding greater freedoms and an end to political persecution.

As the Assad regime escalated the violent response against its own civilians, defections from the military formed the backbone of the opposition fighters. The conflict soon became a civil war, with multiple factions competing for control. Foreign powers, including Iran, Russia, the U.S. intervened, turning the conflict into a proxy war.

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The Human Cost

14 years of war has devastated Syria, resulting in over 500,000 deaths and displacing millions of its citizens. Cities like Aleppo have been heavily bombed, and the country's foundations were largely destroyed. The war's toll on civilians was immense, with the UN estimating that over half of Syria's population had been affected by displacement, poverty, and loss of life. Humanitarian conditions are dire and Syria's political future is ambiguous, but its citizens remain hopeful.

The Syrian pound has been devalued to the point of which it is currently trading in at a little over 13,000 SYP to 1 USD. Before the beginning of the war, it had traded in at around 47 SYP to 1 USD. This drastic change is only one example of the devastation that Syria has endured in the past few decades.





By 2020, over 5.6 million Syrians had fled the country, and millions more were displaced within Syria.

Now, Syrians dispersed around the globe can finally return to their rightful homes. In recent news, families have been reunited after decades. Loved ones have been released from prisons, after years of wrongful detention. Syrians finally have the chance to rebuild their communities and reclaim the sense of belonging that was stolen from them. The prospect of returning brings both hope and healing, as they work to restore not just their homes but also their lives and identities. This moment marks the beginning of a new chapter—one where resilience and unity can pave the way for a brighter future.
